SUBJECT: Appointments and Reappointment Process for Oregon City Arts Commission

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Any Arts Commissioner, that does not wish to reapply, should notify the Chair and their term will end on December 31, 2022.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Three Arts Commissioners terms are coming to an end December 31, 2022.

The three Arts Commissioners, who's terms are expiring should reapply or let their term expire before the application deadline (TBD, expected early to mid-November).

BACKGROUND: In 2021 the Oregon City Arts Commission was reformed, with nine members appointed. The appointments were intended to be three-year appointments, however, since the City did not want to reappoint all nine members every three years it was decided to appoint new members on a staggered replacement system. Any future new appointments or reappointments after that would be appointed to a new three-year term unless fulfilling an already existing appointment.

Three Arts Commissioners were appointed to serve for only one year and would expire at the end of 2022.

Three additional Arts Commissioners were selected to have their terms expire after serving two years (the end of 2023).

Finally, three Arts Commissioners were appointed to a full three-year which would end in 2024.

In September of 2022, the City Recorder began accepting applications for new Arts Commissioners.

At the November 17, 2022 Arts Commission meeting, candidates will be interviewed by the current Arts Commission individually. After the interviews, Arts Commissioners will then select, by vote, the candidate(s) for recommendation to the City Mayor. Arts

Commissioners, seeking reappointment, may abstain from voting or participating in the interviews of other candidates, if they choose.

Once the candidate(s) have been selected, Staff will generate a staff report bringing the Arts Commission recommendation(s) to the Mayor before the December 21, 2022 City Commission meeting. The Mayor, at his or her discretion, may appoint them directly or seek consensus from the City Commission.

SUBJECT: Replacement Art Selection for 7th and Center Street

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

The staff recommend that a member(s) of the Oregon City Arts Commission assist in creating the “Call for Artists” to replace the art, and help staff define how the request for artists’ engagement would be distributed.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The artwork located on the corner of 7th and Center Street was damaged by an out-of-control motor vehicle, resulting in the destruction of the artwork. The damaged artwork was insured, resulting in a payout of \$5,400 by the insurance company.

The Arts Commission is being asked by the City to help with replacing the artwork by identifying and engaging an artist to create a new art sculpture.

BACKGROUND

In 2021 the statue on the south-east corner of 7th and Center Street was damaged by a vehicle and was removed from that location.

The City, the insurance company that covered the statue, and the original artist worked together to evaluate if the statue could be repaired. Due to the artist living outside of the United States and unable to coordinate the repair, the insurance company issued a settlement of \$5,368.02 to replace the art, and the City decided to replace the artwork. To entice arts to respond to the request of engagement, the Arts Commission might consider using some of the funds it has to increase the amount of payment.

It falls to the Oregon City Arts Commission to use these funds to commission a new art piece to replace the damaged statue. The artwork would need to be located on the same corner of 7th and Center Street as the previous statue.

OPTIONS:

1. Staff drafts the “Call for Artists” and distributes the engagement request.
2. Two members of the Arts Commission work together to draft “Call for Artists” and submit the draft to staff for review and distribution.
