OC2040: PRELIMINARY DRAFT VISION STATEMENT

Healthy Communities

Oregon City lives and breathes its rich and challenging history. As the birthplace of the Clowwewalla, Cashhooks, and Molalla Tribes, and the “End of the Oregon Trail,” the community elevates its stories of innovation, oppression, survival, and tragedy. Oregon City honors the fullness of our past and seeks to learn from it through education, art, and cultural programming in community spaces throughout the City and the preservation of our National Register Historic District and local Conservation District. Residents have access to quality education, and partners such as Oregon City School District and Clackamas Community College engage community members of all ages in lifelong learning. This culture of learning leads to engaged residents and diverse, equitable and inclusive communities. People from low income, disadvantaged, marginalized, and communities of color have equitable access to quality of life services that are essential for overall well-being and economic advancement. Oregon City is a city of welcoming neighborhoods, both new and historic, that are connected to nature, grounded in a strong sense of place, and foster personal connections. In 2040, Oregon City’s communities are a place of vitality, support, and opportunity.

Resilient Economy

Oregon City is a thriving and complete town with opportunities where all can live, work, and relax while having access to the amenities of the greater metro region. A variety of diverse housing choices ensures residents have more options to remain in their neighborhoods and be near grandchildren, friends, caregivers, and services. Children growing up in Oregon City have opportunities and stay and thrive. Residents can age in place and meet their housing needs through different stages of life, and our houseless neighbors find shelter and services. A robust economy creates living-wage jobs, and a network of small, local businesses flourish in a progressive business environment. Visitors come to Oregon City to enjoy the lively downtown, as well as local dining, shopping, activities, throughout the City. Community members feel connected at events like the First City Celebration and the farmer’s market. The completed Willamette Falls Legacy Project provides a waterfront destination that serves as an economic engine for the community. In 2040, Oregon City’s economy is vibrant, diversified, and resilient.

Connected Infrastructure

Oregon City connects people to places. In the same way the Municipal Elevator ties together areas within the city, community members are connected across the City through a network of safe and convenient streets, sidewalks, bike paths and multi-use trails. Public transit facilities bring residents to their destinations efficiently, and community members of all ages and abilities can walk, bike, and roll safely between school, work, play and home. A culture of equity, coordination, thoughtful planning and fiscal responsibility guide growth and development. Infrastructure and utilities such as water, sewer and stormwater are improved in established neighborhoods and strategically planned in developing areas. Access to state-of-the-art communication infrastructure closes the digital divide, strengthening education and engagement, and provides a lifeline to emergency services. Oregon City is a collaborative and effective partner that coordinates with neighboring jurisdictions, and regional, statewide, and federal agencies to advance transportation, utility, and communication infrastructure. In 2040, Oregon City residents are connected physically and digitally.

Protected Environment

Oregon City is a leader in protecting the environment and reducing the community's carbon footprint. A Climate Action Plan guides the City's investments in clean energy, waste reduction, air and water pollution mitigation, and supports practices that promote an efficient use of land within the Urban Growth Boundary (UGB). Oregon City's natural resources are woven into the fabric of the City. The powerful Willamette Falls and clean Willamette and Clackamas Rivers are the jewels of Oregon City, inspiring residents to hike, bike, kayak and recreate while supporting healthy habitats for fish, wildlife, and native vegetation. Oregon City is known for its extensive tree canopy, and residents and visitors marvel at the groves of trees, the meandering creeks, and wildlife throughout the city. The McLoughlin Promenade is among a network of trails and greenways that connect local parks and open spaces like the Canemah Bluffs and Hillendale Park. In 2040, Oregon City preserves the integrity of its natural resources, and connects people to nature.

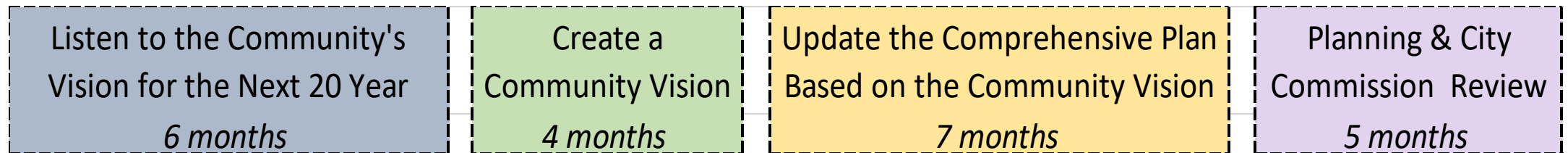

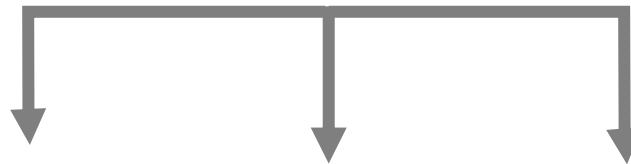

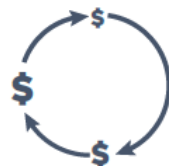
REDMOND 2040 VISION

GREAT NEIGHBORHOODS FOR STRONG COMMUNITIES

Redmond's neighborhoods contribute to retaining its small-town identity with great places to live, work, shop, and play. Residents have access to a variety of high-quality housing choices for a diversity of ages and income levels, designed to provide connectivity, safety and access to services. Neighborhood-scale retail and amenities ensure neighbors can live, work, play and recreate together in one place. Educational, cultural and recreational opportunities strengthen the social fabric of the community. Public art is a forethought, not an afterthought. Culture and diversity are celebrated through community events and activities, lending to a spirit of inclusivity and tolerance. Redmond's agricultural and industrial heritage is reflected through access to the local food system and a revitalized city center and art, maintaining the authenticity of Central Oregon.



BUSINESS-FRIENDLY CULTURE

As a regional economic hub, Redmond is open for business. The City enjoys a resilient and diversified economy that retains and expands local businesses, attracts quality, family-wage jobs, and is connected to the regional, national and global markets. Places like the Redmond Municipal Airport, Deschutes County Fair and Expo Center and Central Oregon Community College (COCC) help put Redmond on the map. The City strengthens businesses and tourism through community-driven partnerships and programs, preserving Redmond's small-town feel while providing a diversity of amenities for its residents.

VISION STATEMENT

In the year 2040, residents of Sherwood appreciate their safe, connected, family-oriented and friendly community. Those who grew up in Sherwood stay for family wage jobs and a high quality of life, and those who raised their families here can retire in the place they proudly call home. Sherwood is renowned for its excellent schools, parks, thriving local businesses, small town feel and access to metropolitan amenities, jobs and natural areas.



Thriving and Diversified Economy

In 2040, the Sherwood economy has grown to include a variety of businesses big and small that offer stable employment opportunities, higher-wage jobs, and balance the tax base to protect and maintain Sherwood's quality of life. Sherwood provides great destinations and experiences for both residents and visitors.



Attractive and Attainable Housing

In 2040, Sherwood has a range of housing choices for a diversity of ages and income levels, providing community members the ability to live in Sherwood throughout all stages of life.



Strong Community, Culture, and Heritage

In 2040, Sherwood successfully retains its treasured small-town character and strong sense of community while welcoming diverse businesses and residents. Old Town preserves its historic atmosphere as an attractive place to shop, dine and gather. The library and performing arts center play a vital role as place of learning and sharing, and art and creativity are woven into the fabric of the city. A variety of community events uphold a legacy of bringing the community together and giving Sherwood a sense of place.



Coordinated and Connected Infrastructure

In 2040, the city's transportation system is efficient, safe and provides transportation options. The town has an active and connected transportation network where residents enjoy walking and bicycle paths between neighborhoods, parks, schools, the Tualatin National Wildlife Refuge and Old Town. Quality public facilities, services, and utilities contribute to a high quality of life. Sherwood has an excellent school system, an asset that draws families to the community. Sherwood residents of all ages enjoy the city's robust park system, community centers and state-of-the-art athletic and recreation facilities.

 - b. Subscribe to a weekly land use notice list at <https://www.orcity.org/subscribe>. (Under Community/Public Information on Main Page) Enter your email, and you will receive a weekly roundup of all land use applications noticed or updated that week in the city. The neighborhood box at the bottom is for city projects and land use applications that are located within a specific neighborhood association boundary. We are beta testing the neighborhood subscription option-so; please let me know if you have any issues.
